From many perspectives *DDRS* illuminates such events and developments as the recognition of the economic and strategic importance of the Middle East, the development of the Cold War and Soviet expansionism, the problem of refugees and displaced persons, the various faces and responses to the end of colonialism in Africa, the economic and social stratification of Latin America, the "miracle" of Western Europe following the devastation and economic collapse of the immediate postwar period, and the application of the "domino theory" in Asia.

*DDRS* is not just for international affairs and foreign policy research. There are significant materials highlighting the political, social, and economic development and forces in post-World War II America. There are documents on the "Communist Scare" of the 1950s; the rise of Black militancy and violence in the 1960s and the white backlash; political and social unrest, particularly the Civil Rights and Anti-War movements; political scandals and abuse of power; the rise of both global and home-grown terrorism; and development of NAFTA and world trade.
